Crime Victim Rights

The right to:

- Protection
- Be notified of criminal charges
- Restitution or reparations (financial assistance)
- Employer intervention services
- Timely notice of Judicial proceedings
- Be present and heard at hearings
- Other rights, including some for children
- See Utah Code: 77-37-3 for an exhaustive list.

Sexual Assault Victims also have the right to:

- Individual Voluntary testing for HIV
- Request HIV testing of an offender
- Be notified of test results
- Access to counseling
- See Utah Code: 77-37-3 for an exhaustive list

Jail Release Agreements

The alleged perpetrator **will not** be released before appearing before a court **unless**:

The alleged perpetrator agreed to comply with the following release conditions:

1. The arrestee will have no personal contact with the victim. Including: telephoning, messaging, otherwise communication with the victim either directly or indirectly.
2. The arrestee will not knowingly enter onto the premises of the victim's residence or any premises temporarily occupied by the victim.
3. The arrestee will not threaten or harass the victim.

OR: The Magistrate issues a Jail Release Order the specifies the release conditions (these may be in addition to the above listed conditions)

Violation of a Jail Release Agreement or Jail Release Order is a Class A Misdemeanor and a Violation of Utah Code 76-5-108

A Victim who is not a minor, may waive, in writing, conditions 1 & 2 . Victim's may not waive condition 3, that prohibits threats and harassment.

**Waivers must be completed in the presence of a law enforcement officer, at a law enforcement agency, at the jail or with the court clerk.*

Voluntary Commitment of Firearms

UCA 53-5c-201

(1)(a)A cohabitant or owner cohabitant may voluntarily commit a firearm to a law enforcement agency or request that a law enforcement officer receive a firearm for safekeeping if the owner cohabitant or cohabitant believes that the owner cohabitant or another cohabitant with access to the firearm is an immediate threat to:

- (i) a cohabitant;
- (ii) the owner cohabitant; or
- (iii) another individual.

- You must attest to live in the same home as the owner of the firearm.
- Firearms may be held up to 60 days OR until return is requested by the owner (except under 53-5c201(2) or; the owner is a restricted person.
- Owners or cohabitants may request the firearm be held an additional 60 days.
- A firearm owner may commit their firearms without providing information about the cohabitant that poses an immediate threat.
